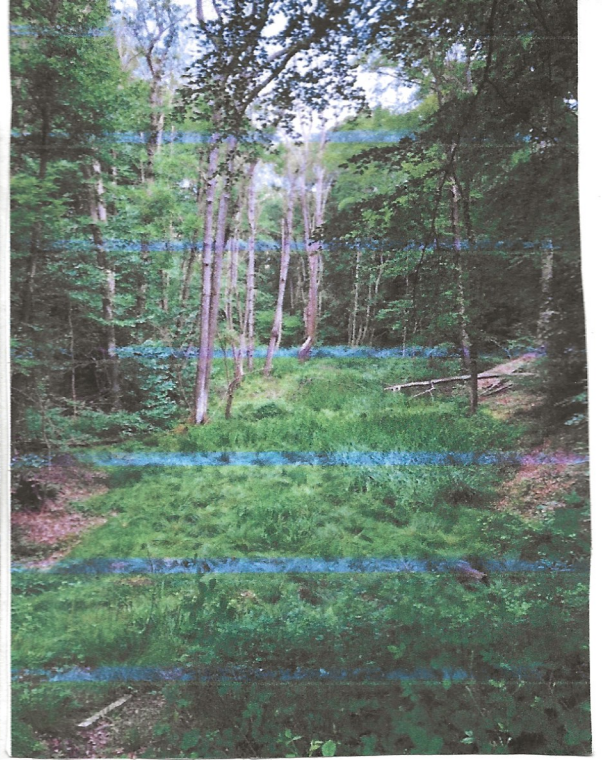
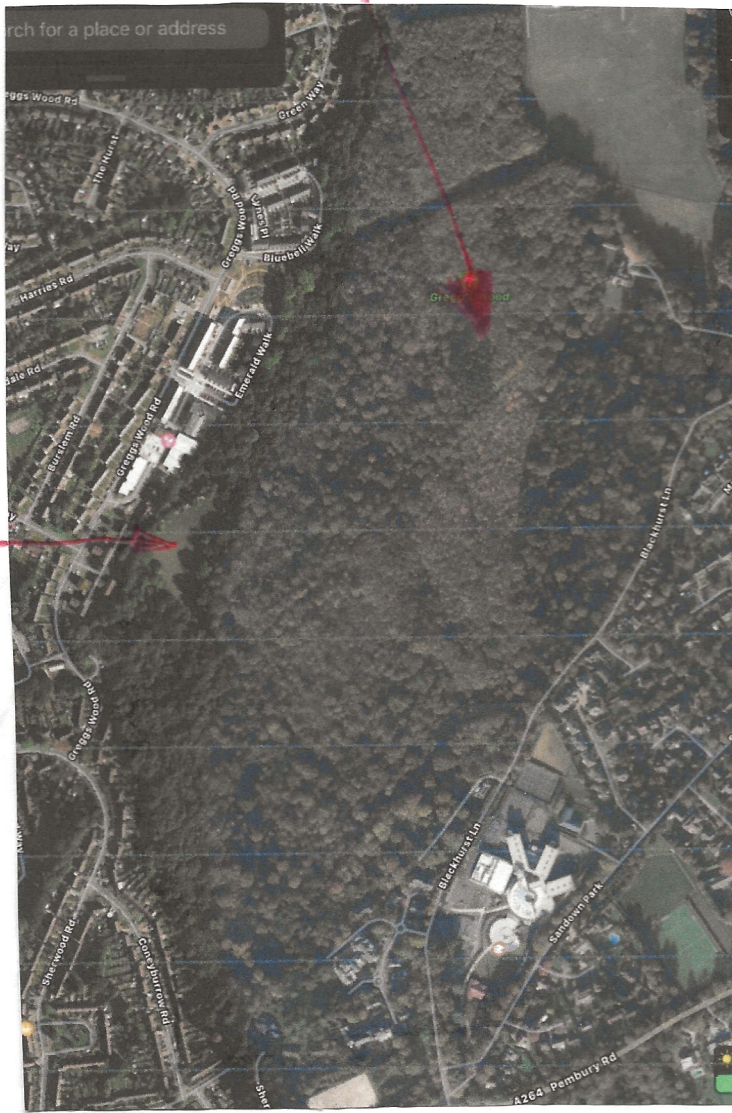


Greggs Wood / SherWood Lake and Woodlands

Vine and ivy

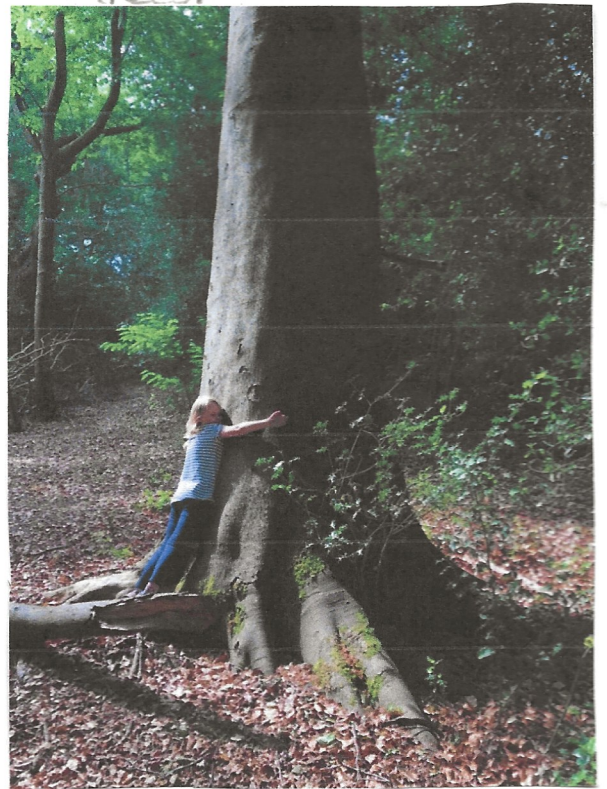
I Was fascinated

and live 700 years



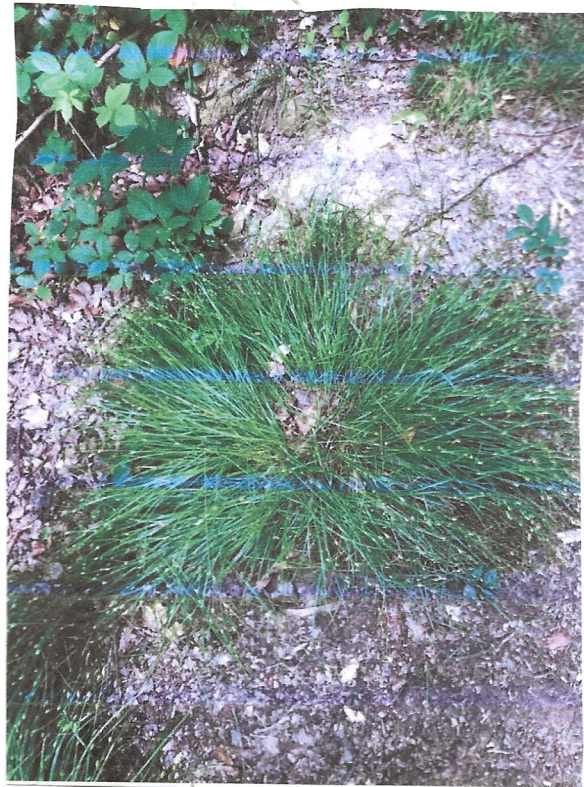
Oak Tree Leaves
