Friday 16th October 2020 Acorn News

We have had a lovely week in Acorn class. In Phonics, we have continued to play some listening games, we focussed on alliteration (words which all start with the same sound), sorting objects and pictures based on their initial sound (for example things starting with s— sun, snow, spoon) and practising segmenting and blending (sound talking a word c-a-t and then putting it back together again).

In Maths, we have been looking at the words 'more' and 'fewer'. We used a 5 frame to compare two amounts (see photo on right). Most of the children understood what more meant. We struggled understanding the word

'fewer', Miss Traviss explained it as a smaller amount or less so this is something we will revisit later. We read the story 'A Squash and a Squeeze' and acted it out by children being the characters and adding themselves to a hoop. We discussed why we

thought the story got its name and how the house

would have felt.



In RE, we talked about who God was and read 'The Creation Story'. We then had a go at making jelly fish, but realised that we couldn't do it. This explains why Christians believe that God is the 'giver of life' and not humans.

During our own learning time, we have been observing Autumnal objects, such as pumpkins, conkers, leaves, acorns. We also enjoyed making marks using a paint brush in glitter.
