We are very excited to announce that in January, we will be taking a group of 30 pupils to the O2 Arena in London to take part in Young Voices 2019.

Young Voices is the largest school choir performance in the world, with between 5000 and 8000 children taking part in each performance. The music is selected specially to create a diverse musical repertoire all with the intention to introduce children to the widest possible spectrum of music. Class News



Acorn News

The children have really enjoyed their first full week at school and are all very tired! We have played some listening games in preparation for starting our phonic sounds next week. During choosing time, lots of us enjoyed wrapping up 'presents' for our parents, we enjoyed playing on the bikes and making lots of different things using the large construction parts. Lots of us enjoyed showing off our numbers skills, a few of us can add two numbers together! We also enjoyed meeting our buddies and spending time getting to know them. Well done to our 'star of the week', Jake, who got to take Nick the Monkey home!

Willow News

This week in English, Willow Class have been sequencing the story of the Three Little Pigs, acting out the story and writing descriptions of the characters using adjectives. In Phonics this week we have learnt about the 'ir' and 'ue' sounds and have been reading tricky words. In Maths, the children have learnt about using the greater than, less than and equals signs. The children have also started learning about ordinal numbers and what they look like (1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, etc). In Science we have been talking about Seasons, particularly Autumn, and the class drew Autumn pictures. In RE, the class heard the story of The Lost Sheep and wrote about something they would like help with. In PE the class have been playing games involving throwing, catching or kicking a ball.

Beech News

In Art this week we used Clay and Plasticine to model thumb pots and relief tiles. We used inspiration from our Wilderness Wood trip to decorate our clay and we hope to paint them next week.

Maple News

This week in Maple Class we have been continuing to explore the Stone Age. We have been using 'Stone Age Boy' to think about the thoughts, feelings and actions of being in a reindeer hunt and we have been using alliteration to help us find ways to describe a deep, dank, cold, clammy cave. In Maths we have been moving from ways to represent and reason with 3 digit numbers using objects to using problems using 3 digit numbers. In Science we have been studying how fossils are formed. And in Topic we have been finding out about how Stonehenge was built and about the neolithic farmers and fishermen of Skara Brae in the Orkney Islands.

Chestnut News

In English this week, we have been writing descriptive accounts of the stage of a volcanic eruption. We will be using this work when we write our own stories. We have been re-telling the story 'Escape from Pompeii' and writing story maps to ensure that we are familiar with the structure of the story. We have broken it down into sections and have begun to plan the changes we will make when we write our own stories. The children are really stretching themselves with vocabulary and I am looking forward to some exciting extended writing next week.

We have been working with number lines from 0-10,000 in Maths. We have looked at ways to help ourselves mark out blank number lines using our knowledge of place value. We have also looked at number lines starting and ending at different intervals and using our skills to problem solve.

In Topic work, we have been learning about the Roman army. We thought about how the empire could have spread from such small beginnings to take over parts of Europe and Africa. We have also started to study Roman mosaics and will be designing and creating our own shortly.

In our Science unit 'sound', we have been learning about the structure of the ear. We have also been thinking about animals that have very good hearing, how they move their ears and how the shape and size of their ears is important.

Thank you to children who have brought in some lovely autumnal finds for our nature table!

Lilac News

In Maths this week we completed our objective about rounding numbers by working in pairs to solve problems. We then moved onto our new objective about counting forwards and backwards in powers of ten. We had to complete number sequences and use our reasoning skills to explain why mathematical statements were wrong and why we thought this was the case. In English, we started our next piece of extended writing. Our focus is to describe setting where we are writing about what our character, (a Spanish Conquistador in 1519) saw, heard, smelt and felt when he travelled through the tropical rainforest of Mesoamerica and discovered the ancient Mayan ruins. This week, not only did we brainstorm ideas as a whole class but we also created in pairs mind maps in preparation for our draft writing next week. We have also been using a thesaurus to build our brilliant vocabulary and develop our language.

In Science this week, we started to make power points about an aspect of our Solar System that we wanted to find out more about. Some of us chose one of the planets as a topic and others chose the Sun, Moon and Asteroid Belt. In RE, we have been reading selected texts from the Bible and thinking about what they say about God. We have then connected these to our key words we are exploring at the moment: Omnipotent, Omniscient, Eternal, Loving and Holy. Father John came in to talk to us in more detail about these texts and how they relate to these words. In Topic, we have continued with our work about Mayan artefacts and what they tell us about Mayan life. We have also been examining Mayan art and have used them as inspiration for our own Mayan designs, using oil pastels. We found out that Mayan art is very colourful and the Sun and animals can often be found in their art work. In PE this week, we have continued to practise our football skills.

Just a reminder to say that our class trip to The Science Observatory at Herstmonceux is on Wednesday 31st October. Thank you so much to the parents who have already responded to the Parentmail.

Oak News

It's been another busy week in Oak Class. After researching our significant figures from World War II, we are now beginning to draft our biographical reports. We have been focusing on sentence structure in order to make our writing as interesting as possible for the reader, and have set ourselves the challenge to include simple, compound and complex sentences in our work. Additionally, we have looked at active and passive sentences and experimented with changing between the two.

In Maths, we began by revisiting column subtraction and have now moved on to long multiplication, with the aim of being able to multiply two, three and four digit numbers. There can be a lot to remember with long multiplication but the class have persevered and are now beginning to use it to solve multi-step problems.

In Science, we are still on our topic of evolution and have been looking at how fossils can give us clues to how animals have evolved over time. We have also had a go at making our own fossils embedded in rock and hope to have a go at excavating them next week.

One of the best things about this week was that we finally got to go and meet our buddies in Acorn. We had a great time reading to them and getting to know them better.
