Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Application)

Developing Identify two noun phrases in a single clause sentence, then rewrite it using a different noun phrase. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives.

Expected Identify two noun phrases in a multi-clause sentence, then rewrite it using a different noun phrase. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives.

Greater Depth Identify two noun phrases in a multi-clause sentence, then rewrite it using a different noun phrase. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives, adverbs and/or prepositions.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Application)

Developing Create three different expanded noun phrases using a word bank. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives.

Expected Create three different expanded noun phrases using a word bank. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives.

Greater Depth Use words from a word bank to begin an expanded noun phrase, then complete it. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives, adverbs and/or prepositions.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain whether a noun phrase has been correctly identified in a single clause sentence. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives.

Expected Explain whether a noun phrase has been correctly identified in a multi-clause sentence. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives.

Greater Depth Explain whether a noun phrase has been correctly identified in a multi-clause sentence. Noun phrases are expanded with adjectives, adverbs and/or prepositions.

Application and Reasoning

Identifying Noun Phrases

Developing

- 1a. My new ball; the icy river. Various answers to the second part, for example: My new ball rolled into the busy road.
- 2a. Various possible answers, for example: a huge tree; my young puppy; the hungry baby.
- 3a. He is correct because the words 'the' and 'creaky' give more information about the noun 'door', making the noun phrase.

Expected

- 4a. The young child; his shabby teddy. Various answers to the second part, for example: The little baby liked to cuddle his shabby teddy when he was tired.
- 5a. Various possible answers, for example: the wicked, old witch; my shiny, new shoes; a gnarled, old tree.
- 6a. She is correct because the words 'the' and 'delicious' give more information about the noun 'ice cream', making the noun phrase.

Greater Depth

- 7a. The suddenly unsteady building behind us; the rumbling earthquake. Various answers to the second part, for example: The parked bus outside shook violently as the rumbling earthquake began.
- 8a. Various possible answers, for example: a young woman with long, black hair.
- 9a. She is correct because the words 'the', 'triple-layered' and 'with nuts on top' give more information about the noun 'cake', making the noun phrase.

Application and Reasoning

Identifying Noun Phrases

Developing

- 1b. That hungry man; a huge pie. Various answers to the second part, for example: That lucky woman is eating a huge pie.
- 2b. Various possible answers, for example: the small bear; an untidy desk; my straight hair.
- 3b. She is incorrect because the word 'my' gives more information about the noun 'knee', so should be underlined as part of the noun phrase.

Expected

- 4b. The grey ship; the massive iceberg. Various answers to the second part, for example: The grey ship was heading straight for the desperate windsurfer, but it turned away just in time.
- 5b. Various possible answers, for example: a delicious, cold drink; an old, derelict house; the terrified, small boy.
- 6b. He is incorrect because he has not underlined the noun ('gorilla'), nor the words which give more information about it ('the' and 'large').

Greater Depth

- 7b. A selfish man in front of Sammi; some very important scenes. Various answers to the second part, for example: A selfish man in front of Sammi kept standing up, and this prevented her from seeing her favourite actor.
- 8b. Various possible answers, for example: the tall tree in my garden.
- 9b. He is incorrect because the prepositional phrase 'near the park' gives more information about the noun 'café', so should be underlined as part of the noun phrase.
